## Resolve Disability Discrimination Against People with Opioid Use Disorder On March 17, 2022, the Justice Department reached a settlement agreement with Ready to Work, a not-for-profit residential, work,

and social services program for individuals who are homeless, with facilities in Aurora and Boulder, Colorado. The agreement resolves a complaint under Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) that Ready to Work discriminated against an individual with opioid use disorder (OUD) by denying her admission to its residential, work, and social services program because she uses a prescribed medication to treat her OUD. Under the agreement, Ready to Work will not deny services on the basis of disability, including OUD, or apply standards or criteria that screen out individuals with disabilities. The agreement also requires Ready to Work to adopt non-discrimination policies, train staff on its nondiscrimination obligations, and report on compliance. Ready to Work will also pay damages to the Complainant. Scheduled Substances

#### The U.S. House of Representatives on Friday voted 220-204 to remove marijuana from the list of scheduled substances so that growing, selling, or possessing the drug would no longer carry criminal penalties. The Marijuana Opportunity Reinvestment and Expungement (MORE) Act would also create a

process to expunge non-violent marijuana convictions and review criminal sentences for offenders, and impose a five percent federal tax on cannabis that eventually increases to eight percent, a portion of which would fund programs aimed at helping communities affected by the war on drugs. Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer plans to introduce a separate marijuana bill this month. This measure still needs to go through the U.S. Senate and will need to be signed by President Biden before it actually becomes law.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported an estimated 105,752 people

#### died from overdoses during a 12-month period ending October 2021, a record high. Of those deaths, approximately two-thirds (2/3) involved fentanyl and other synthetic opioids. The CDC

reports overdose deaths increased in all states, excluding New Hampshire, Hawaii, Delaware, and Wyoming compared to the previous year. Overdose deaths increased by almost 40% involving methamphetamines and other psychostimulants from the previous year. Read article <u>HERE</u>

Things are really picking up on the legislative front. MCRSP already reported the unfortunate news that the U.S. Congress did not adopt a large increase in the federal substance abuse block grant (SABG) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022. Without the large increase, the 10-percent set aside for recovery programs was also left

It is important that legislators hear from constituents on these matters. The House of Representatives' Energy and Commerce Committee will be holding a hearing on Tuesday, April 5, to begin the process of reauthorizing the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA). As part of this reauthorization process, several changes to SAMHSA have been proposed. One is a change to the name of the agency. Under the current proposed legislation, "Substance Abuse" will be changed to "Substance Use," a change that advocates have been trying to

make for several years to eliminate the stigmatizing language in the agency's name. MCRSP and its national coalition are also trying to include a 10-percent set aside for recovery programs in the SABG in this authorizing legislation. One of the reasons appropriators cited for not including the 10-percent set aside in this year's appropriations bill was that the 10-percent set aside was not authorized under SAMHSA. We

are hoping to remove that excuse in the FY20023 appropriations bill by getting the set aside authorized as part of the SAMHSA legislation. Things have also been busy in the Missouri State Capitol. Last week, the House Budget Committee marked up its FY2023 budget bill. The bill will be considered on the House floor on Tuesday. April 5, and will then be sent to the Senate. Funding for Recovery Support Services (RSS) have stayed the same as the FY2022 levels. In addition, however, are funds that have been sent to the state through the federal government, which has basically doubled the size of the RSS program. Also last week, the Missouri Senate passed the Missouri Prison Nursery bill. Several Missouri lawmakers are working to pass the bill that would allow women in prison to stay with their newborn babies for up to 18

MCRSP is continuing to work on HB2527, a tax credit for donations made to recovery organizations in the state. The bill is still held up in the House Rules Committee for Administrative Oversight. However, members of the House and Senate plan to offer the legislation as amendments on the House and Senate floors when appropriate bills come before those bodies for consideration.
