

June 20, 2022 Edition 2 Volume 12 Governor Signs Bills into Law

Governor Mike Parson signed six Bills into law on June 16, 2022. These included:

• SB718 - Designates HBCU Week and modifies a provision regarding higher education. The bill also creates a workforce

diploma program to help adults obtain a high school diploma and requires public higher educational institutions in the state to publish the new 988 mental health hotline number on the back of student IDs. SB799 - Modifies the offense of escaping from custody HB2162 - This bill establishes that the Director of the Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) may issue

a statewide standing order for an addiction mitigation medication, also known as Naloxone. Any licensed pharmacist may sell and dispense this addiction mitigation medication under a physician protocol or statewide standing

order. A pharmacist acting in good faith and with reasonable care that sells or dispenses an addiction mitigation medication shall not be subject to any criminal or civil liability or professional disciplinary action for prescribing or dispensing such medication or for any resulting outcome. It shall be permissible for any person to possess an addiction mitigation medication. The bill also expands the number of departments that may access the state's opioid settlement funds, to also include the Department of Correction (DOC), the Office of Administration (OA), and the judiciary. This "Opioid Addiction Treatment and Recovery Fund" currently only applies to the Department of Mental Health (DMH), the Department of Public Safety (DPS), Department of Social Services (DSS), and DHSS to pay for opioid addiction treatment and prevention services and health care and law enforcement costs related to opioid addiction treatment and prevention. HB1472 - Modifies provisions relating to the offense of money laundering with the goal of giving law enforcement additional tools to curb human trafficking.


